Letter from Head of School

This has been a time for celebrations in Ramallah. Aside from the extraordinary Easter parade just passed, a week ago we held our Field Day celebration. It was a great time for the community from both campuses to come together to celebrate 150 years of RFS. Over 2,500 people came through the gates and were treated by performances from children, displays of robotics and art, and dance and other performances.

As I spoke during the opening, in celebrating 150 years we connect with our mission and our origins. We celebrate those who began RFS so long ago and through this year's celebrations we recognize that we are the stewards of RFS.

## Alumni in the Spotlight

Meet RFS alumnus, Class of 2006 Assistant professor in the Mechanical Engineering Department at the American University of Beirut, Omar Awartani. Omar attended North Carolina State University (NCSU) where he completed his B.Sc. in Aerospace Engineering (2010), and M.Sc. and Ph.D. in Mechanical Engineering (2015).

He received his post-doctorate in Physics at NCSU and Berkeley National Lab (2015-2017), where he was able to investigate nano-morphology and organic solar cells in relation to their electrical performance using advanced X-ray characterization techniques

In 2017, Omar joined Intel Corporation as part of the Portland Technology Development (PTD) where he worked in the plasma tech group developing the next generation of microprocessors' nano-features. Most recently, in 2019, he joined the Department of Mechanical Engineering at the American University of Beirut as an assistant Professor.

When asked about being a student at RFS, Omar said:

"I loved my time at FBS. It was stressful at times and a lot of hard work went into it for sure, but it was a great learning environment and my teachers did a very good job in giving us a strong foundation to catapult off of to whatever we chose to do next, particularly in the fields of science and

We asked Omar about the school's effect on his life, and he

"I believe the environment in FBS, alongside the culture in Ramallah in general, helped us grow into global citizens yet with a strong Palestinian identity, which is a difficult balance to strike in my opinion."



Omar ended our interview with a few words to future RFS alumni saying:

"Generally speaking, our students are smart and motivated and that is a wonderful thing so I don't think I need to say much. However, if I were to give them some advice I would perhaps address it to 11th and 12th graders. I would say don't worry too much about what major to choose for your undergraduate studies. You can always transfer to another major after your first or second year. Or you can pursue a Master's degree afterwards and steer your career into a different direction. But the important thing is to find something that you are passionate about. The other thing I would say is if you are interested in studying abroad there are many great universities in this world that offer elite level education. The top 10 schools in any discipline are superb, of course, and you should aim to get into them, however, there are more than 10 great schools in the world so make sure you apply to universities within top 10, 20, 30, 40...etc. to improve your chances of admission. Lastly, research the town or city the college is located in and make sure that this is an area that you would enjoy living in for 4 years"\*

The White Gifts giving was instituted to give foodstuffs and money to needy families. There was a conscious endeavo support. As World War Two came to ar end, once again the schools continued to struggle to be a positive influence in a troubled world.

The Friends School commencement that year with 47 graduates was perhaps the most moving one the schools had ye experienced. Even as the exercises were going on in the auditorium, hundreds of refugees were fleeing into Ramallah Students and families assembled for a happy occasion could hear explosions in nearby Jerusalem.

For a period, the International Red Cross occupied the Boys School buildings with the school providing accommodations boarded up to store medical supplies. \*




