Letter from Head of School

Welcome to the new academic year. We are excited by what this year will bring. Last year we celebrated record IB results and the school's first perfect score of 45. We celebrated our 150th year and we will continue our celebrations with a Gala Dinner in December. So much has been achieved in the past year and we look forward to this coming year.

I am writing this from New England Yearly Meeting in Castleton, Vermont. New England Yearly Meeting gathered this summer for the 359th consecutive year. This year the theme of the meeting was "Provoke one another to Love," from an epistle written by Margaret Fell in 1656. Today we hear in this phrase the reminder that we do not travel on this journey alone, but that we need one another to fully hear God's desires for us. In the original epistle, this phrase is preceded by this advice: "Let Love the Eternal Light search you ...it will rip you up and lay you open" This is not an easy journey given to us.

I had the honor of meeting the Hussey family in Maine. The Hussey Plow Company was established in 1835 by William Hussey, a farmer and native of North Berwick. The Hussey family were part of the New England Yearly Meeting. RFS and the New England Yearly Meeting are deeply connected both spiritually and historically. Now nearly 200 years later, still in North Berwick, the Hussey Seating Company is known throughout the sports world.

RFS' "I Know I Can" Summer Academies 2019

210 students spent four weeks of exhilarating activities and critical learning at the 6th annual I Know I Can Summer Academy for K-2nd and 3rd-5th. The combined programs with a local and international staff guided students in thinking critically about identity, community and homeland through authentic children's literature in English.

Students read Sitti's Secrets by Palestinian-American author Naomi Shihab Nye. Naomi Shihab Nye and her brother were both students at the Friends School in the late 1960s. On July 30th, students and staff participated in an international video call with the author, who is now based in San Antonio, Texas, USA. Students read original poetry to the author, and Shihab Nye read to students from Sitti's Secrets. Students had a chance to ask the author a variety of questions.

Apart from building literacy skills, students participated in a wide range of recreational activities including dodgeball, soccer, basketball, kickball, painting, Karaoke, Zumba and photography. In the photography class, students learned about guidelines of taking good "selfies," composition, portraiture, color and lighting. In painting, students learned how to mix color, illustrate small details such as the seeds of a watermelon or the leaves of a pineapple.







The IKIC Summer Academy strives to provide a wide range of educational experience that build on the children's artistic, physical and academic talents.





In early June, 1967 the Six-Day War brought upheaval to Ramallah. The city became part of the Occupied Territory ruled by an Israeli military governor. Freedom of movement was restricted. During the war, dozens of Israeli military shells fell into the Boys School and Swift House area. Hundreds of windows were broken, trees were badly cut, the school car was hit, and a small outbuilding took a direct hit causing great damage. Fortunately, none of the major buildings were damaged badly. Nevertheless, one teacher reported, "There is a feeling of uncertainty, depression, and a deep longing for peace and security and justice."

The Friends Schools opened September 5th, 1967, with considerable tension, with some political opposition, reduced enrollment and subnormal attendance. The schools ceased to be boarding schools as families feared for the safety of their children and school officials did not want the responsibility of boarders during such dangerous times. Student enrollment plummeted.*


Welcome to the Upper Campus

Alumni in the Spotlight

Meet RFS alumnus, Class of 1959 graduate Samir Abdul

After graduating from RFS, Samir attended the American University of Beirut for his BA degree in Civil Engineering. He later moved to Dubai, where he worked for 40 years with one of the top 10 firms in the MENA region in the field of construction; Khatib & Alami (K&A). As Vice Chairman on the Board of K&A, he worked on tens of the largest construction projects in the region. Abdul Hadi is currently a member of Birzeit University's Board of Trustees and resides in Amman, Jordan.

The OP got the chance to speak with Abdul Hadi during the summer, and he said that RFS had a great impact on his life academically, socially and even on the physical level.

And he continued:

"The things we learned at the Friends School and experience we shared affected our lives on the long run, we were taught the basis of equality, no matter of our backgrounds. You wouldn't feel the difference between the child of a minister, governor or a worker, we were all the same, and we all had to do the same tasks from cleaning, gardening and providing service in the dining room."


