


Engaging Parents in Interdisciplinary Learning:

How we express ourselves

After years of dedicated work on the implementation of the Primary Years Program (PYP) at the Lower School, we are about to make a quantum leap in the field of Palestinian education. Now we are knocking down classroom walls physically and metaphorically.

We believe that each student's home, school, community, and environment shape her/his learning experience. Through collaborative planning, our teachers are preparing the grounds for inquiry-based learning, where our students actively participate at the center of the learning process.

Our vision at RFS stems from the belief that learning occurs best when connected to life and reality, not when imposed on students, and where adults are facilitators rather than lecturers. It is this vision that led us through the transdisciplinary theme How we express ourselves this semester, as third-grade students and their facilitators engaged in addressing the central idea that "people can create and manipulate messages to influence audiences."

This unit of enquiry was planned specifically to involve parent participation. Our teachers/facilitators invited parents who are media experts to engage with our students and introduce them to persuasive writing. Students learned how images and text are used to influence the behavior of targeted audiences. They also got to experience how to inquire about critical evaluation of messages presented in the media and how audiences respond to them.

The expertise of these participating parents added to our implementation of this unit, supporting our teachers and students in reaching a higher level of understanding of the world around them.

As these third-graders leap into the fourth grade, my hope is that they now have a better and wider understanding of both how they can express themselves and how they can understand what is being presented to them through the media.

Annual White Gifts Program and the Christmas Concert

 December was a very exciting month at the Lower School. Before starting winter break, we distributed \$11,100 in donations to 141 needy families in Ramallah and El-Bireh. As every year, the White Gifts program continues to serve our community and reflect the Quaker value of empathy. In a joint effort, our students, parents, and faculty succeeded, again, in collecting donations and organizing weekly bake sales.

At our Christmas concert, all of our 700 students, grades pre-k through fifth, performed wonderful Western and Eastern Christmas carols to a large audience of enthusiastic parents. This year, some students also played musical instruments alongside their peers, while a few grades performed choreographed dances.

Our teaching staff spent weeks training all classes and preparing individual costumes for our students, while decorations were mostly hand-made by students and teachers from recycled materials.

Activities leading students into our library

- The library committee kept busy this semester, organizing Movie Nights for first-graders in December, and sixth-graders in May, aimed at raising money for library activities.
- As part of our PYP (IB Primary Years Program), a number of well-known Palestinian story-tellers were invited to introduce our students to the beautiful art of oral storytelling. To strengthen parent involvement, we were glad to have parents and grandparents join this activity as well!

IT Accomplishments

• We finally made the transition to our new student portal, *Edunation*, in the aim to develop better communications between teachers and parents regarding all school issues: announcements, home assignments, study materials, activities, grades, attendance, conduct, and many other issues.

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Announcing the Establishment of the Leila Miqdadi Al-Qattan Scholarship Fund

We are pleased to announce the establishment of the Leila Miqdadi Al-Qattan Endowed Scholarship thanks to the support of our longtime friend and generous supporter, Mr. Abdel Mohsin Al-Qattan, in loving memory of his wife and former RFS student Mrs. Leila Miqdadi Al-Qattan (1934–2015).

A keen supporter of the most vulnerable and a strong believer in the transformative power of education, **Leila Miqdadi Al-Qattan** (pictured above) often expressed her affinity and support to RFS, which she attended in her early years.

The Leila Miqdadi Al-Qattan Scholarship will safeguard the opportunity for exceptional students from economically disadvantaged Palestinian families to join our community. This endeavor clearly helps us in answering our mission of providing life-transforming equal opportunities to disadvantaged students, and in increasing diversity within our student body. The fund will also support preparing students for enrollment in our academically rigorous bilingual program. One year prior

to enrollment, students will be supported through private English-language tutoring. In addition, at least two of the fund's recipients in any given year will be students with identified special needs who will enroll in our renowned Learning Support Program. It is expected that the scholarship fund will support around ten students at a time and will continue as long as the school remains in existence.

The endowment fund, totaling one million U.S. dollars, will be invested and the distributions will support disadvantaged Palestinian students recruited mainly from public and UNRWA schools. Our first student recipients will enroll in the academic year 2018–2019.

Additionally, in honor of both Mrs Leila Miqdadi Al-Qattan's and Mr. Abdel Mohsin Al-Qattan's long-standing support of RFS and their contribution to the development of culture and education in Palestine, the RFS Board of Trustees made a decision to name the Science and Arts Building on the Upper School Campus The Leila and Abdel Mohsin Al-Qattan Science and Arts Building.

Professional Development

• Some weekly and monthly workshops were carried out for all our teaching staff on-campus. In February, we held a full-day workshop on how to "Teach like a Champion"—a follow up to last year's workshop on classroom management and methods that support the educational process. Twenty-one teachers and administrators attended a two-day workshop on "Making PYP Happen in the Classroom" that was instructed by an IBO-certified trainer. In December, myself and the Head of Kindergarten traveled to Amman, Jordan, to attend a three-day teacher skills conference.

Educational Resources

 We purchased a number of new educational resources this year aimed at ensuring differentiation in learning and enhancing inquiry-based learning.

Other Activities

 In February, the PTA organized a joint parent-student activity, "Family e-Bingo"—and I am proud to say it was the first of its kind in Palestine!

MYP Evaluation Report

 I am proud to announce that the Upper School received a positive report from the International Baccalaureate Organization in The Hague, regarding the Middle Years Program (MYP) evaluation that is administered every five years. IB World schools undergo this evaluation process periodically to ensure that all standards and practices are implemented.

PalMUN 2017 Conference

 In January, we hosted the seventh annual Palestinian Model United Nations Conference under the theme "Unification Through Negotiation." The conference saw six hundred students from fifteen Palestinian schools visit our campus and engage in diplomatic discourse for three days. Unfortunately, our Gazan participants were not allowed entry into the West Bank by the Israeli army.

Athletic Activities

In March, we hosted a national "Land Day" soccer tournament
that included the participation of more than twenty schools
on a sunny day that was full of cheering! Our female and male
basketball teams participated in tournaments in Jordan, and
managed to come home with some medals.

Drama Club

• In April, the Drama Club performed this year's play to an audience of more than 700 people. Our students truly outdid themselves, showing that they are risk-takers and critical thinkers. The Upper School's Modern Dance Troupe also participated in the performance, as did our junior actors from sixth and seventh grades who went onstage—anxiously—for the first time.

"Tell Me and I Forget"

When I think of the Da Vinci studio in RFS' new Middle School building, the first thing that comes to my mind is that it is a place where students lead their own learning process through inquiry.

Over the past two hundred years, the world has witnessed exponential development in various fields to meet the needs of human beings. Teaching and learning, however, seem to have undergone the least of that change.

The Da Vinci Studio comes as a form of educational reform: a space designed for the use of the arts and sciences merged together. As a teacher, the Da Vinci studio turned my world upside down. It gave me and my students the opportunity to be creative inquirers, thinkers, and risk takers. My students finally got the opportunity to seek knowledge for themselves, and my role was transformed from *teacher* to *facilitator*.

As facilitator, my goal was to offer a more creative, inquiry-based approach to subjects that have always been offered traditionally. For me, the Da Vinci studio allows me to implement the highest ideals of the IB Middle Years Program by focusing on interdisciplinary hands-on and project-based approaches to learning.

We felt great triumph when discussing how different metals vary in their reactivity. Instead of presenting these reactivity series for students to memorize, they were required to investigate reactivity by performing different reactions on unknown metals and noting the variation in each metal type's reactivity. Students then discussed their observations with each other as groups, and were finally able to deduce their own reactivity series.

The Da Vinci studio gave learning and teaching a new meaning. The student becomes a scientist and an artist. It is a place where ingenuity, creativity, and innovation are born.

 Our second annual Personal Project Exhibition was full of student-designed projects presenting various interesting topics, such as contemporary home decor, poetry, folkloric story writing, recycling, child labor, and others.

Caring for the Environment

 As spring appeared, students started revisiting our on-campus organic garden, planting various vegetables, caring for them, and finally, picking their own organic crops. Recycling worn-out house appliances, school computers—and even old uniforms—were also part of our Environmental program this year. With the help of their IT teachers, students redesigned old computer hardware into new usable house artifacts.
