


looking back

School life today at FGS is not the same as it used to be. One main difference is that it is not a boarding school anymore.

Siham Halteh, presently the school librarian was a student here many years ago. She recalls:

The day started at 6 a.m.



We were approximately 40 boarders. We each had our own small bed. Girls came from all over Palestine and even from Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Syria, Lebanon, and other Arab countries.

Every day after school, they took a walk and after that they had a snack. A bell rang at 5 p.m. reminding them that it was time for their one hour studying period in the library. From 6 until 7 p.m. they had their dinner and after that they studied until 9 p.m.



Many doors have already been open for us by other women. We should not only make use of them but open new ones ourselves.





INTERVIEW

During the school year of 1984-1985 the yearbook staff met with the new principal of FGS and asked him about a number of issues concerning the school.

The first topic was why Mr.Kapenga decided to become principal of FGS. Mr. Kapenga has had contact with both FGS and FBS during the years of 1977-1982 as a teacher. After being away for two years out of the clear blue sky he received a telegram asking him to become principal of the school. He considered it and decided it would be a good job.

"I wanted something new."

Mr. Kapenga was next asked what affect the political situation has on the school. He believes it has great influence, partially because students here are aware of what is happening to their people.

"Politics enters the classroom whether or not a principal or a teacher wants it to."

He sees politics manifested in activities such as debka and classroom discussions. It is also visible in the form of strikes. Mr. Kapenga didn't deny that school strikes important. He noted that some students believe that strikes are a way to protest against the situation in which they forced to live. But he often finds that students give answers which are unclear when asked about their reasons striking.

"Strikes are easy, you don't have to do anything. You just pick up your books and leave."

A follow-up question considered whether students should participate in demonstrations. Our principal knows that he cannot make decisions for the students but he feels that students overlook the consequences of demonstrating.

"Demonstrating can mean being put in jail, or even death. It isn't just having fun by going out and screaming in the streets. It has a much deeper meaning than that."

Two problems that exist at FGS are the competition between English Speaking and Arabic Speaking and money. Conflicts arise as a result of differences in thought and values of the Arabic and English Speaking sections. Mr. Kapenga believes that we deal with this problem in the best way possible. As for the financial situation he sadly acknowleges the fact that there is not enough money to finance additional upgrading of the school.


"But we make do with what we have."

The fourth area of inquiry dealt with improvement in the school since 1981. He has seen many changes which have been beneficial to the school. These include the Arts program, which may enable students who are

discover talent in painting or drama, the typing and computer program, and the student leadership of the school. He also pleased with the fact that science students graduate from FGS.

"I think that we are moving and we shouldn't stop. There is always room for new things and we should keep up the improvement."








Mrs. Hala Husari has been working here as secretary and administrative assistant for thirteen years. Most of the time her work is very rewarding but there are exceptions.


V: More classrooms would help and it would be good to stop alot of the erosion of the grounds that has occurred over the years. And George is right, trash is no fun.

V: I am hopeful George can come to visit me in the United States. He deserves a vacation.







The painting class was one of the places which one went to to display her tarents and dedication - an opportunity which FGS gives to most of its students.











One disputed subject here at FGS is school "The Palestinians are deprived of almost all strikes. human rights, the only right we have for protest is strikes, we should take advantage of it," feels one secondary student. While another student feels, "Nobody knows when we strike and nobody cares." These are two different opinions that are often discussed when school strikes arise. On the one hand it is not possible for us to ignore the Israeli occupation of our land. One can not remain indifferent to its injustices towards the Palestinians. Through striking we show our protest. Although the objectives are unclear to some students one of our apparent goals is publicity. question that should be asked is does the public know when we strike? Are we achieving our objective? Or are we just losing out on our education? Some students do not feel school strikes accomplish anything. They do feel that general strikes are more "beneficial for Palestinians" than school strikes themselves.

We all probably agree that striking is a complicated subject. There are many pros and cons to striking. Striking raises many serious questions that only time and effort on all our parts will be able to answer.
