A Surprising History

The Friends Girls School, or FGS, was founded in 1869 by the Quakers. (Quaker being a religion, a sect of Christianity, and Quakers being the people who believed in this faith.) The Friends Girls School was not always called by this name. It was first called the Girls Training Home. It was a boarding school when it first started, so parents from all over sent their daughters (at that time it was a girls school) to study here. 80-90 girls boarded here and additional students lived nearby. In 1889, the first 2 floors of the main building were built. Ms. Katie Gabriel, a Quaker from Lebanon, was the first principal at FGS.

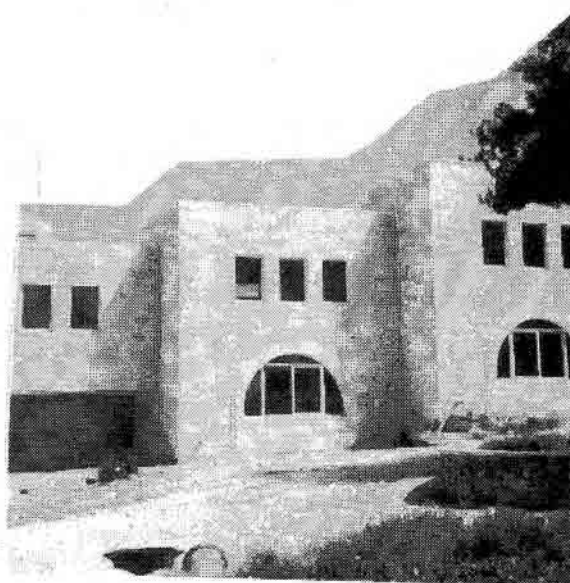


During the period of World War I, between the years of 1915 to about 1919-20, the school closed. After the war, it reopened and remained open during World War II. In 1956, it also closed, but only for a short period.

In 1967, the year of the occupation, FGS experienced a whirlwind of change. Students no longer boarded and religion classes began to be taught in place of the ethics courses that had emphasized the common ideas of all faiths. Instead of all subjects being taught in English, most subjects started to be taught in Arabic. Everyone began to look down on things Western and everyone and everything became more Palestinian.

Until recently, FGS was a girls school, except for kindergarten through second grade and some secondary classes. After the Intifada started, all classes became coeducational. The Board of Directors and the administration of the school thought it was a good idea to merge and they still think so since it has proved to be successful. Parents still are sending their sons and daughters here to learn about their language, culture and homeland.

As can be seen by the history of FGS until now, it is a school that is able to face the unexpected.

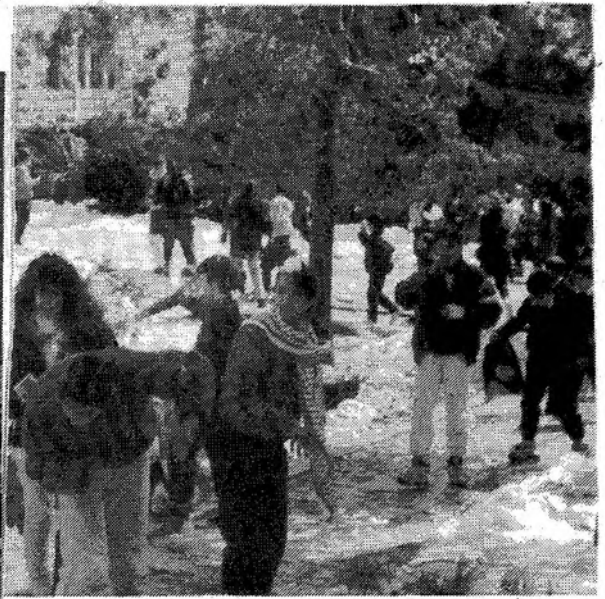
The agreement by Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, Palestine and Syria to participate in conferences aimed at bringing about peace is very surprising. It is a change of policy for all of these countries. In October of 1991, these countries, with the two co-sponsors, the U.S. and the former Soviet Union, met in Madrid to try to write the first chapter of peace. Since then they have completed six rounds of negotiations. There is some skepticism at FGS as to whether or not the Palestinians will gain anything from the peace process. There are some people who feel that the Palestinian delegation is putting all they've got on the negotiating table, but that it is nearly impossible to negotiate with Israel. Palestinians have been waiting nearly 45 years for a homeland. Many students at FGS feel that we should be able to get it back in a peaceful manner. Whatever happens in the peace process, hopefully we won't lose anything by trying. Inshallah, we'll regain our homeland.

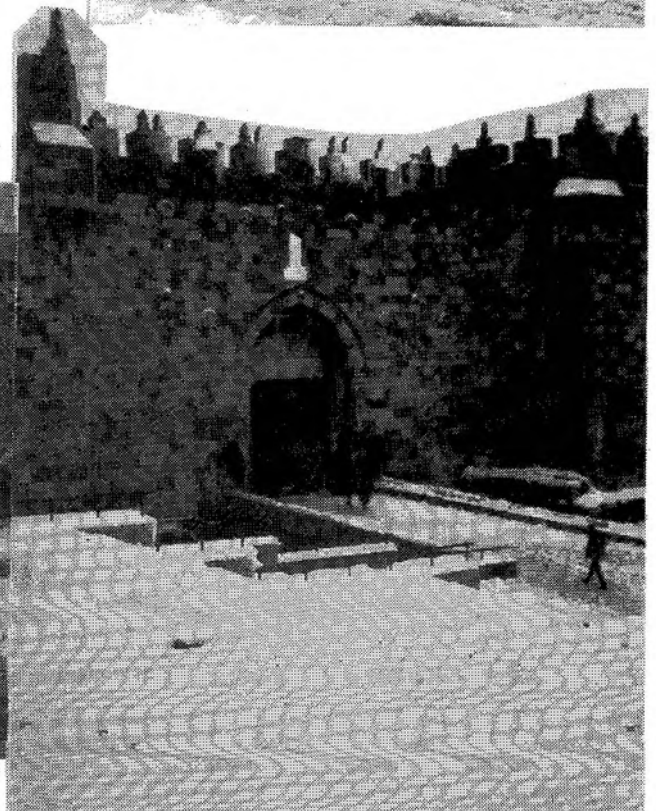
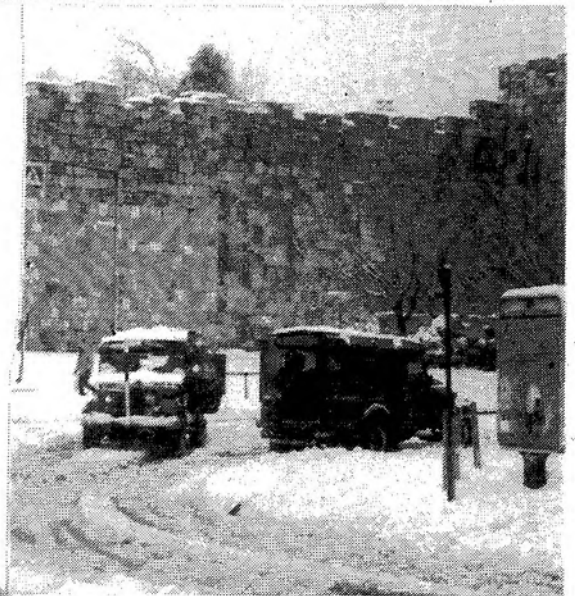

White Palestine



This year was full of harsh weather, the most surprising of which was snow! The rainfall all last year was far lower than the snow that fell this year. People said that they had never seen as much snow as they saw this year. Surprisingly, students from this school didn't like snow all that much. They said that they liked it the first time, but after that it was just too much. Snow made them cold and it was boring because every time it snowed they had to stay at home until the snow melted. Well, that's life in a white Palestine.



The village of Mazra' Al-Sharqieh was under curfew in January for almost 10 days. The killing of an Israeli man was the reason for this strict curfew. The first two nights, Israeli soldiers slept in the village. During these two days, the Palestinians living in the village went through a lot of pain and suffering. When the soldiers first entered this peaceful village, they saw a young boy and blindfolded him. They tied him up and put him in the middle of the street where he had to endure the freezing temperatures. They finally released him after several hours. The soldiers searched houses and did many awful things to the Palestinian people. Many of the Palestinians had to pay fines if they just opened their doors or went to hang clothes to dry. Many people ran out of food. They had to sneak out of their homes to borrow or buy some from a nearby store. The Israelis finally left Mazra' Al-Sharqieh and moved to the entrance of Silwad (which was also under curfew.) They still wouldn't allow anyone into or out of Mazra' Al-Sharqieh. Hopefully it won't happen, but don't be surprised if soldiers come to your village and call out "curfew!"



Curfews



Ramallah was under a very strict curfew in December. The Israeli soldiers put this curfew on Ramallah and El Bireh after a settler was killed in El Bireh. The curfew was in effect for two weeks. During this time, the soldiers searched houses and the settlers inflicted damage upon personal property. Even after the 24-hour curfew was lifted, a nighttime curfew remained in effect.

This curfew affected the Palestinians in many ways. Students didn't go to school for two weeks. People couldn't work for two weeks. Many people ran out of food and heating fuel as no one had expected this curfew. We hope that Ramallah doesn't have to experience such a curfew ever again.



A Block to Settlement Activity?

During this last year, we have seen unexpected reactions to settlement activity. It was very surprising to us that America finally rejected one of Israel's requests for loan guarantees. This request was rejected because the loan was going to finance the cost of settlements on occupied Palestinian land. This move allows the peace process to proceed without breaking up over settlement activity. Although this move on America's part is a good start, it is a shock to see that all of our brothers and sisters in the rich Gulf States don't take a bigger stand on the issue of settlement activities. There have been almost 400,000 immigrants coming to Israel from the former Soviet Union and most of them are settling on our land. FGS students feel that if the U.S. continues to reject loan guarantees to Israel, Israel will be backed into a financial corner. These same students feel that all Arab countries should unite to force Israel to cede the land it has occupied and to stop all settlement activity once and for all.

Most important were the fall of the U.S.S.R., the blockade of Libya, events in Afghanistan, civil war in Yugoslavia and the L.A. riots. Why is all of this happening in such a short period of time? Is it something to do with the end of the Cold War and the beginning of simple understanding between countries and peoples? Or perhaps it is just because people are noticing the plights of various people more.

The fall of the U.S.S.R. was received with different emotions by different people. Some teachers and students felt that it was a sad and terrible thing. One teacher said that the U.S.S.R. was needed as a balancing power. A girl said, "It was so sad. We cried." Yet most people in the West think that the people of the former Soviet Union now have more freedom when compared with their previous situation. The only thing that everyone seems to agree on is the fact that it was very unexpected. The political world is like a stack of coins. Once you take out an important coin, you then allow more room for the others. Somehow the stack has to settle back into some new order. God willing, the world will one day settle into some peaceful order.

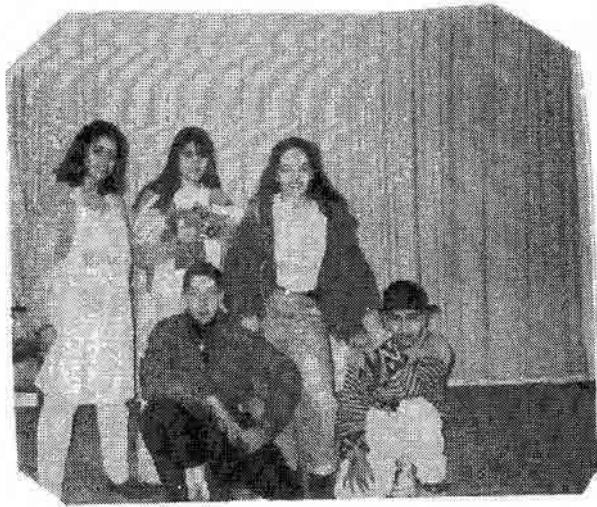

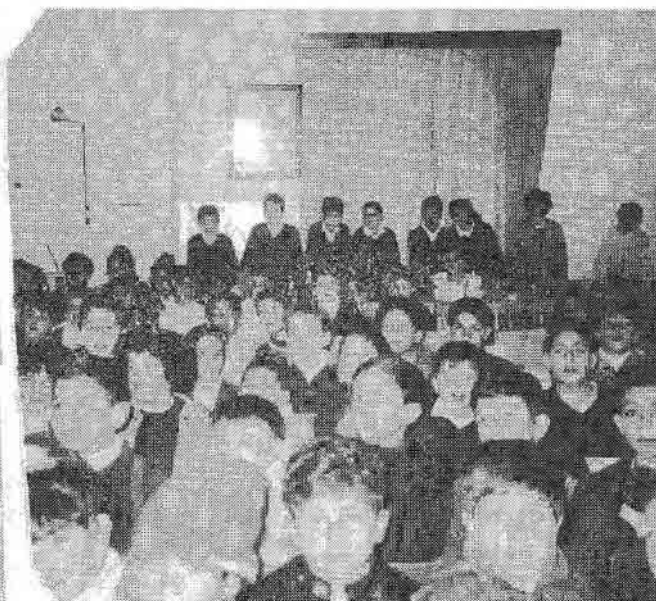
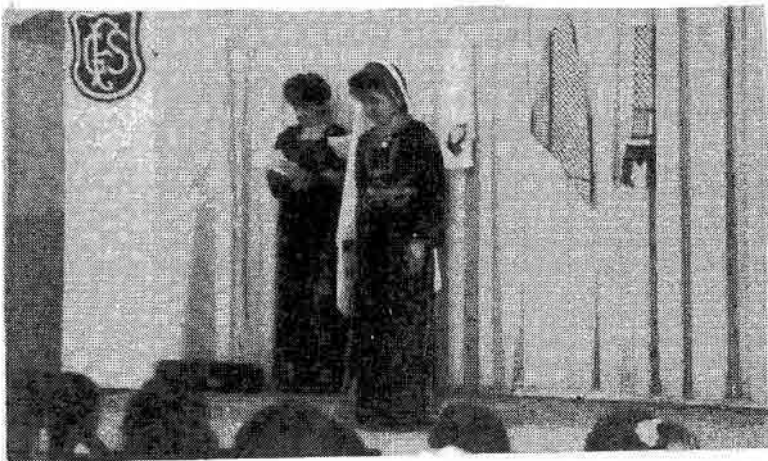

Chapel



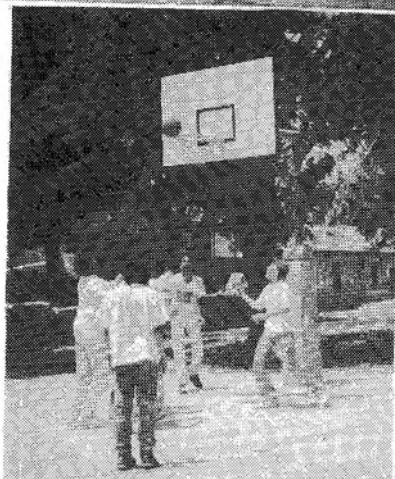
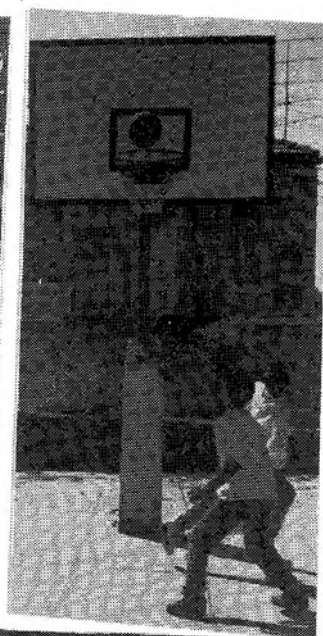
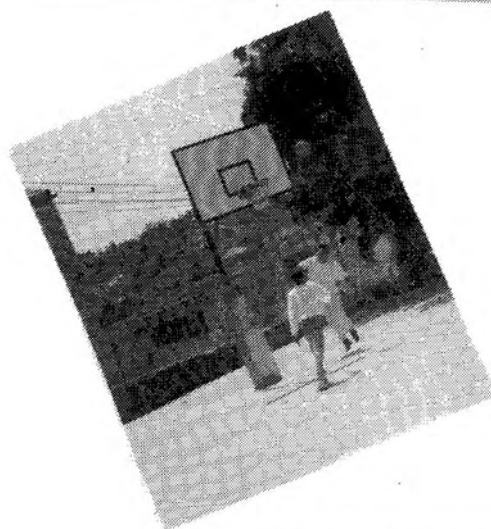
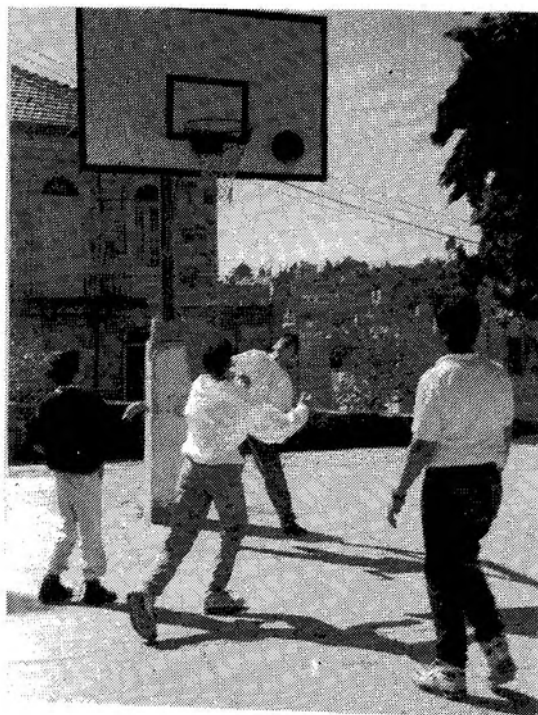

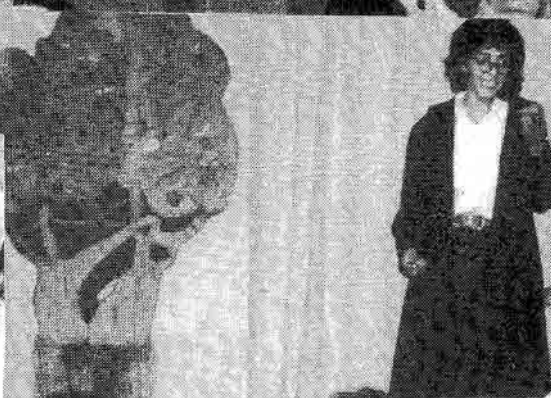
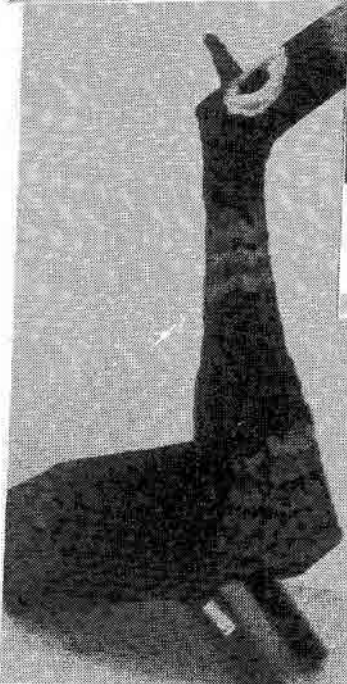
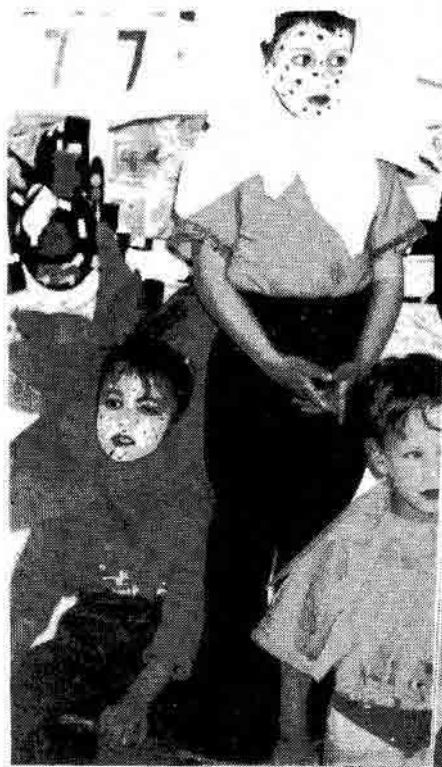


FGS Club
