Quaker Value of Integrity

Letter from Head of School

We have decided that we would take the opportunity to relook at the values that this school is based on. We are a school which offers rigorous programs guided by Quaker principles. The theme for this issue of the Olive Press is integrity. What does integrity mean? Integrity is about consistency between word and deed. I often describe it as saying what you mean and meaning what you say. The American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) describes it as the need to deal honestly with all others and with oneself.

This is summarized by the old injunction: "Let your yea be yea and your nay be nay." Having integrity means being authentic and having consistency between one's values and one's actions. Lack of integrity separates us from our own soul and from our community. Quakers try to live according to the deepest truth they know and this means speaking the truth to all, including people in positions of power. It is interesting that Friends do not take oaths when appearing in a court of law because they reject the idea that there is one standard of truth for daily living and another for the court.

What does this mean for us as a school? I think schools are very human places and that means that at times there is going to be misunderstandings between students and also between members of our community. The best thing that we can do as a community is to role model the Quaker testimonies to our students.

This means how we relate to each other, how we speak to each other and what we say to each other is based on integrity and openness. Parents send their children to RFS not only for the education that we offer but also for the values that this school imparts to them. We want our students to leave RFS and young people with character and integrity. Thomas Jefferson once said "It is in our lives and not our words that our religion must be read." I think there is a great truth in that. It is our actions and not our words by which people should judge us.*

Go Palestine Summer Program

For the past seven years Go Palestine has made it its mission to connect diaspora Palestinian youths to their homeland. The founders Sa'ed Atshan, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Peace and Conflict Studies, Swarthmore College; and Joyce Ajlouny, RFS director from 2003-2016, wanted a summer program for students all across the world to visit Palestine for the purpose of understanding their heritage.

Go Palestine is a unique experience for international and RFS campers. Go Palestine is so much more than a summer camp; it is a journey of discovery. Both a physical and spiritual experience, campers have the opportunity to walk through the cobble stones of the old city of Hebron, smell the sea salt of Akka and squeeze themselves through the concrete walls of the Balata refugee camp. Palestine has a story to tell, through Go Palestine, for many this will be the first time they hear it.

Go Palestine gradually builds on learning and exploration. Campers learn their culture through personal experience. Making "taboon" bread on a wooden stove and dicing parsley for tabbouleh is a part of their rich history. Getting their hands dirty through community service, whether it be picking various fruits from trees, helping with the harvest for local farmers, or rehabilitation of a community park. Community service is essential for campers where they can discover their full potential.

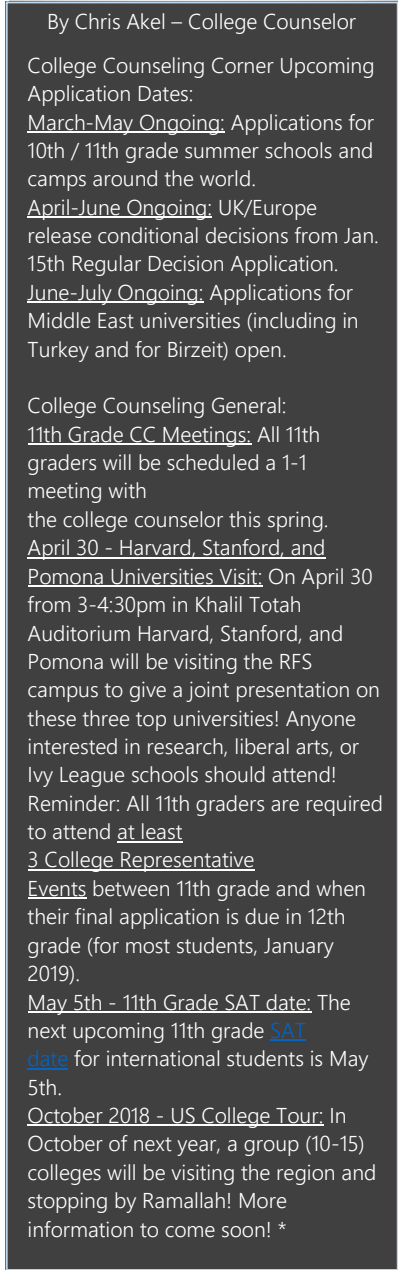
The summer travel experience for Quaker and/or Palestinian diaspora youth

The first is to increase student SAT scores by an average of 200 points. The camp accomplishes this by bringing in expert teachers from Palestine and around the world who have the content knowledge and pedagogical expertise to help students master the complicated test. However, we recognize that students do better when they are enjoying learning, especially in the summertime. Thus, rather than utilizing “drill-and-kill” methods, teachers incorporate a variety of competitions, music, and debates into their classrooms, so that students are engaged with their learning. In fact, according to student surveys, 95% say they had fun during the summer and 96% said they would recommend it to a friend.

Although, high SAT scores are important because they are required for elite American universities, equally as important for us, is our second goal of helping students find their passions and career goals. We accomplish this through not only a special college counseling class devoted to personal statements, but also by building individual relationships with students in each class. The students I have worked with in Palestine are some of my favorite students, and I love getting the opportunity to work with them.*
