

Laial Habil, The Veiled Woman 8th Grade Oil




Dana Anani, As Time Passes 12th Grade Acrylic and Pen





Lujayen Tannous, Hibiscus Bloom 12th Grade Acrylic




Dana Anani, The Heart of Life 12th Grade Acrylic



Though striving for uniqueness proved to challenging, Leen leaves a mark of hope and remembrance on us through her painting, which she calls 'a language that reveals emotions and stories without words.'










