

# **Innovative Middle School Building Now Open**

In pursuit of its goal to become one of Palestine's leading educational institutions, Ramallah Friends School is determined to experiment with new methodology and curricula in the service of our local community and of high academic standards. To this end, the Middle Years Program (MYP) was introduced in 2010, as a means of better preparing our students for the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Program during their high school years.

In order to meet the educational standards and requirements of the IB Middle Years Program, RFS constructed a new building for students in grades six, seven, and eight. Opening in the academic year 2016–2017, the Middle School building has become a part of the Upper School campus, with thanks to design, construction, and furnishings funded by ASHA/USAID.

The design of the new building was informed by the intention to create a supportive, healthy, and functional environment for learning. Based on our vision of an inspirational learning space, we worked with the design firm Fielding Nair International, specialists in innovative school design.

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## Innovative Middle School Building Now Open

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The Middle School learning community that was designed to meet our vision is quite different from a traditional classroom. To encourage a collaborative and student-centered approach to learning, our building consists of three floors which each contain a common area as an informal learning station outside the classrooms.

Furthermore, the classrooms have glass walls to allow teachers to assist students during their collaborative work in the common area, and to further affirm the spaces as one learning community. Each floor includes learning support, counseling rooms, and a teachers' lounge for grade-level teachers to meet and participate in ongoing professional development and planning for interdisciplinary units. Each floor also contains one Da Vinci Studio.

Da Vinci Studios are learning spaces designed for hands-on and project-based approaches to learning across all curriculum areas. These student-centered interdisciplinary areas adapt easily from a science lab to an art studio, and support practical work in visual arts and the science curriculum areas.

On the ground floor, the media center/library serves several purposes. It includes an area for individuals and small groups to work together and do presentations; networked computer research stations; and a traditional print resources section.

Because technology plays such an important role in supporting both students' learning process and their teachers' efforts to promote learning, all learning areas and school facilities are fully equipped with computers and smart projectors connected through both wired and wireless digital networks.

Ramallah Friends School continues to rigorously develop and implement learning strategies which align with the school's vision: to produce a generation equipped with a strong and constructive mind-set to serve their own communities and to face the future with knowledge, skills, confidence, and the determination to fulfill their dreams.

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## Learning Empathy Through Taking Action!

Duha Masri is a source of inspiration to her students. Guided by the principles set out in the school's Quaker values and the IB Learner Profile, Ms. Masri led an initiative last year to assist in the rehabilitation of ten elementary school libraries in Gaza which had all suffered severe damage during the Israeli assault on the Strip in 2014.

Duha Masri is Head of Kindergarten, and the Primary Years Program (PYP) coordinator at the Lower School. "We are not a charity, we empathize and we take action," said Duha as she described the significance for her students of learning that they can act in a positive and constructive way rather than feeling helpless as their peers experience adversity. Duha believes empathy evolves through community work, and that students will learn, be inspired, and become involved in their world by taking action.

The PYP initiative, titled *Books for Gaza*, successfully collected nearly 7,900 books, and a substantial monetary contribution of \$54,000, before it concluded last year. However, the work continues today as communications and transfer of material between RFS and various Gaza-based institutions continues. One example is Al-Khidr Monastery in Deir Al-Balah, a 1700-year-old monastery that is currently being renovated by Nawa for Culture and Arts Association, where a children's library is due to be opened for the first time in the city. In November,

this new library will be stocked with books donated through the RFS campaign, along with other library materials.

The *Books for Gaza* campaign was driven by an urge to practice our school values and philosophies, and had a positive impact on all parties involved. RFS' young students were heavily involved from the onset. They visited libraries and were responsible for choosing the various books that they felt their peers in Gaza would enjoy.

The drive for this campaign accentuated the importance of decent and dignified education. Duha believes that this form of cooperation is not a favor, but rather our collective duty as responsible human beings.

With this chant, about 140 students from the third through sixth grades started their day for a whole month at the *I Know I Can*, *Too* Summer Academy Camp that was held at the Lower School (FGS) during July, 2016, in collaboration with *Teach for America*.

For the past few years, this program that develops students' English-language reading and writing skills, and offers extracurricular activities with a wide variety of team-building games, has been a significant success due to the inspiring and devoted team of international English teachers, teacher assistants, volunteers, and

managers. Supportive parents and dedicated, enthusiastic campers are an integral part of this success.

This summer, we worked on three main themes: respect for self and others; issues of social justice; and changing the world for the better. Topics were offered in fun and engaging ways through reading and writing projects, and activities where students steered the learning process.

Part of what made the program special were the diverse activities offered in the afternoons. Indoor activities included digital art, arts and crafts, journalism, TV/radio broadcasting, strategy games, science club, drama, and slam poetry. Outdoor activities included rugby, yoga, dodgeball, basketball, kickball, team sports, zumba, and dance.

Games varied from team-building activities to intellectual thinking games that were both thrilling and challenging.
